



A LOCAL HISTORICAL GEM!

Have you got family connections here?

NORTON WATER MILL

Walk down Norton Mill Lane or cross the field from Back Lane by public footpath ('Miller Balk Lane', on the map) and you will see a reminder of the parish's long agricultural past.

Norton Water Mill has been a listed building for 30 years, but the probable site of a water mill for over nine centuries. William the Conqueror's 1086 Domesday Book is the first written record of a water mill at Norton.

The present stone and pan tile building, dates only from about 1800, but would have been preceded by earlier mills. Evidence for this has been revealed in mediaeval stone-work excavated as part of the current restoration and recorded by archaeologists because the listed building is on part of the Norton Priory Manorial Complex, a protected Scheduled Monument.

The surviving iron and wood waterwheel dates from about 1890 when two Yorkshire brothers named Thornton came to Norton and installed iron mill machinery similar to that used for water powered mills in the then thriving West Riding textile industry. Two generations of the Thornton family operated a corn milling business here through the 20th century up to 1970, specializing in supplying animal feeds to local farms and to villagers who in past times kept backyard chickens and pigs.

A surviving relative of the Thornton family visited last year to tell us she was evacuated as an 8 year old to the mill at the outbreak of World War 2 in 1939 with her mother, the miller's sister. Now in her late eighties she remembers being made to ride bareback on a family pig down Norton Mill Lane, by her uncle the miller Alderson Thornton!

One even longer lived recent visitor is Tom Troop, born in 1919, brought up at neighbouring Priory Farm, with clear boyhood memories of helping at the mill in the 1930s, with water drawn from a spring near the Went, and villagers bringing their radio batteries to be re-charged by waterpower, before Norton was connected to mains electricity.

So the importance of the mill for Norton today is not just a building from its past, but a source of memories for families with long connections with the local area. If you have any family memories of Norton's water mill the Parish Council Magazine would like to hear from you.

Campsall Village Hall's New Extension

At last our new extension is just about completed; we just need to get the floor coverings down. The kitchen is much bigger, and now accessible to wheelchairs. We have two new toilets for women, a decent baby changing area, and a new store room.

The dingy old bar has gone, giving us a larger brighter lounge. Many have remarked about the time it has taken, but it hasn't been an easy project with our limited funds (and the hall being more than 90 years old!). We discovered rotten timbers requiring the whole of the old kitchen roof to be replaced, instead of just the planned grafting-on. We had numerous other headaches such as rising damp, and being required to fit an automated fireproof shutter over the new bar hatch, as well as installing a comprehensive fire alarm system to the whole hall (the old hand-cranked bell just isn't enough these days!). But all this means that our hall will be safer, comfier, and much more versatile.

We're grateful to the Veolia Environmental Trust whose grant made this all possible in the first place, to Norton Parish Council who helped towards the additional roofing cost, to Gordon Yates of Sentry Doors Carcroft for donating the kitchen fire door and to Mark Blackett who fitted it for free. Thanks also to Howdens Joinery for donating and installing the kitchen fittings, and in particular to Jason of J Building Services Ltd Askern. *Chris Brophy*



NEWS AROUND THE PARISH

The A19 within our parish comes into focus in the next few months...

Two key projects will affect road users and whilst all will benefit in the longer term through the proposed changes, there will inevitably be disruption for a while.

Selby Rd Level Crossing

The automatic half-barrier railway crossing on Selby Road is to be completely upgraded and the existing barrier replaced with a safer full-barrier type – much more modern in design and far safer than the present one.

NETWORK RAIL and Doncaster MBC have issued a letter of explanation for all those residents likely to be affected, a copy of which is **included within the pages of this magazine.** Work being done during the road closure will include new road lighting, drainage and road signage.

Reducing speed near the junction of the A19 and Norton Common Road

For far too long, there has been much anxiety for motorists joining the A19 at Selby Road from Norton Common Road. Sight lines are restricted and traffic speed is unrestricted along the stretch of road from both the north and the south. The speed of traffic is also a continuing problem for the residents of the houses especially those just south of the junction in emerging from their houses on to the A19.

Norton Parish Council and Doncaster MBC have been campaigning for reduced speed signs and road markings in this area and we have eventually secured agreement for change from the Highways Agency. Meetings and plans are taking place – watch out for further news!

CAMPSALL COUNTRY PARK - UPDATE

Just to let you know that the current phase of the habitat works is now complete. The willow has been removed from the drainage and this has been re-profiled in a way to retain moisture. The two inter-linked scrapes have also been created and again will retain water for longer – they are designed to be ephemeral water bodies which will benefit a large array of invertebrates which in turn provide greater feeding opportunities for a range of fauna.



Unfortunately, the approach to the site is quite rutted and around the new habitat is quite churned up, but as soon as conditions improve a mini-digger will be used to level the ruts and disturbed soil.

Please tell your friends and co-users of the park, that in the longer term we shall have a livelier and more attractive environment. The pile of stumps will probably have to remain there for now, but they will be a valuable habitat for wood boring insects and other wildlife, and will soon become less noticeable.

The Litter Squad

I am pleased to say that the Litter Squad is back out and about again after the Christmas break. We cleared the length of Sutton Road between Campsall and Sutton. Why do we do this?

It still worries me that there is a lot of litter to be found when you have a look around, even in the grass verges where not many people walk. Not only does it look unsightly, it damages the environment and is harmful to wildlife.

Litter can blow around and block up drains. Glass bottles smash which can puncture car tyres as well as injure people and the feet of domestic animals. Much of the litter is plastic which does not degrade and so will not rot away. This can be a problem for wild life that may swallow small bits of plastic or get plastic twisted around their legs and feet. Birds can get plastic wrapped around their beaks and so be unable to eat.

I think most of us are careful not to drop litter, if we could all pick up just one piece of litter when we are out and about it would make such a difference.

Of course I am now going to ask for volunteers to help the Litter Squad. We meet once a month on a Wednesday for just two hours, usually the last Wednesday of the month, from 1.30-3.30pm to clear a planned area. If you think you can help please give me a call.
