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An epic journey for two local cyclists ...



Bern Jurejko & Gerry Holliday are neighbours in Campsall who in their 60's took up cycling a little more seriously. Over the past 12 years they have cycled regularly together covering over 6,000 miles in and around Yorkshire, Derbyshire and various regions in Spain.

A few years after starting the pair agreed that they wanted a more exciting and adventurous cycling challenge and decided to attempt the world- famous **Camino de Santiago** (Way of Saint James) pilgrimage route. It is the world's third most important Christian pilgrimage destination after Jerusalem and Rome. The route has many starting points in Europe that all end in the city of Santiago de Compostela in Galicia Northwest Spain, where it is believed that the body of the apostle Saint James is buried in the city's' cathedral.

They both had different reasons for attempting this challenging pilgrimage. However, the main aim was to complete the journey together and experience views of breathtaking landscapes across southwest France and in Spain, the regions of Navarra, La Rioja, Castille y Leon and Galicia, as well as seeing ancient monuments, villages and cities along the way.

For the successful completion of such a journey, they knew that they would need personal self-belief, curiosity, a wish to learn and the determination to push themselves physically and mentally on a route where "pilgrims' of all types are united by their own journeys.

Bern and Gerry knew that meticulous preparation would be key to their success and so planned every aspect of their Camino which would begin in Biarritz, South West France. This ensured they had a detailed route/itinerary with pre-booked hotel stops that allowed adequate time to cycle achievable distances between overnight stops, rest periods as well as time for sightseeing. All aspects were very important as they had no back up or support vehicles, so their bikes had to carry all personal belongings along with emergency provisions for the trip.

Their journey would take them along a cycling route of some 620 miles (1000 kilometres) and pass through some very mountainous terrain (total elevation climb of 18,500 metres which is the equivalent of cycling up Mount Everest twice!) before arriving in Santiago de Compostela. Due to the severity of the route and the extremely high temperatures of the Spanish summer climate, they planned to complete the route in two stages within a 12-month period.

This is our Camino

After flying into Biarritz and building up our bikes, the first leg of our journey was to cycle to St Jean Pied de Port, a popular start point for many "pilgrims" who have for over 1,200 years passed through to visit the remains of St. James (Santiago, in Spanish).

Here we each bought our Pilgrims Passports (Credencial). This important document officially recorded our journey with Sellos (stamps) gained in the many towns and villages along the Camino and entitled us to spend nights in the pilgrims dormitories and hostels. It also provided proof that we had at least either walked the last 100 kilometres, or cycled the last 200 kilometres of the Camino to enable us to receive our Compostela (certificate) from the Cathedral in Santiago de Compostela.

Our first major challenge on leaving St Jean Pied de Port was to cross over the Pyrenees Mountain range into Northern Spain. After a testing 1400m accent we were pleased to cycle into the grounds of the awesome historic Monasterial complex in Roncesvalles, Navarro in Spain for a well-deserved rest.

As we left Roncesvalles there was a stark reminder of the size of the task ahead when we passed a road sign showing that it was 790kms to Santiago de Compostela. Road signs were a regular and welcoming sight along the route as we cycled through open countryside, vibrant big cities and countless delightful small towns and villages, all with at least a bar, a shop and historic buildings where we could collect our Sellos.

Our route took us through beautiful countryside, villages, towns and cities, which gave us the opportunity to experience the myths, legends traditions and history of the Way of Saint James. Finding our way was easy as the signed pilgrimage route took us through the historic centres with the clearly marked scallop shell symbols showing us the way.

Entering Pamplona at the time of its annual San Fermin Fiesta was a real highlight. Here, 'running with the bulls' is a spectacle and the town was full to capacity with people celebrating a week of fiestas. The next place of interest after leaving Pamplona was the historic bridge of Puente de la Reina. It is at this point that all of the various Caminos meet and join to form one single Camino into the city of Santiago de Compostela.

Highlights and Reflection.

It is not possible to do justice to all of the sights, experiences and highlights of such an epic journey but here are a few:

- Arrival in Biarritz with trepidation, excitement and anticipation ahead of our first leg to St Jean Pied de Port
- Experiencing the spectacular and varied landscapes,
- Cycling over three big mountain climbs, the Pyrenees at 1200m, near Manjarin at 1440m and O'Cebreiro at 1300m
- Drinking at the free wine fountain at Irache Bodega
- Seeing hens in the main church at Santa Domingo de la Calzada
- Visiting cities of Burgos, Leon and seeing the Episcopal Palace in Astoria built by Gaudi
- Stopping at the pilgrims 'monument, the Cruz de Ferro near Manjarin, the highest point on the Camino. Then following tradition by leaving our engraved stone to symbolize our journey and taking time to reflect on the pilgrims from all over the world who over many years also left their mementos.
- Meeting many people from all over the world and hearing their individual experiences encountered on their journeys
- Reaching" Monte de Gozo" (the hill of joy) and the delight of our first sighting of the Cathedral of St James, Santiago de Compostela in the distance.
- The excitement and anticipation of arriving at the cathedral in Santiago de Compostela when we ccycled into Praza do Obradoiro, the main square.
- Us all shaking hands in celebration of the completion of our Camino adventure.
- Visiting the tomb of St James in the cathedral and receiving our last Sellos.
- Being awarded our Compostela (certificate) endorsing the completion of our quest.

Our initial investment in good preparation and planning enabled us to gain an appreciation of the Camino history, myths and legends.

As a bicycle trip it was a great tour and completing our "pilgrimage" was very rewarding. It was mostly good fun and at times there were moving experiences. It was certainly challenging but such a good way to meet some interesting people and savor the Spanish traditional regional cuisines, excellent wines and culture from the regions we travelled.

Our thoughts are with Lister Wilson who despite having a terminal illness completed the whole Camino with us but then sadly passed away shortly afterwards.
